SALM 145'S THEME of praise and worship is one that reminds me of the constancy of God's greatness and sovereignty. Our response to his unfathomable greatness is to praise and worship him and tell of his works to the generations. This past year in Generations Christian Education, and our school communities, has been one of challenge, perspective and achievement. Challenges included the on-going COVID-19 protocols impacting our ability to meet face-to face for classroom work or community events. In this we gained new perspectives on the ability within our students to respond well to change and challenge; within our staff to create new and effective modes of engaged teaching & learning; and within our broader community to rise to the emerging needs around school community support, wellbeing, communications and prayer. We have experienced, in the midst of an extraordinary year, many achievements, demonstrating that seemingly adverse circumstances cannot stop the progress of God's purposes for our schools, our families and our students. A few highlights:

Small World Christian Kindergarten – Small World closed the year with a flourish by achieving IEYC accreditation- achieving 5 out of 9 mastering commendations overall, and

thanks to our community strength, 9 out of 9 mastering commendations in the community category! Small World celebrated its 35th Anniversary this year, and the depth of Small World's influence in the broader HK community was also recognized with the award of "Kindergarten of the Year" in Hong Kong Living magazine's Education Awards.

NIS - Year on year, NIS has displayed improved academic achievements, as measured via independent test scores, this year with limited testing due to COVID-19 restrictions, the community continued to show undaunted support and resilience in many areas. The PTA, working with staff, resolved to facilitate community involvement and connections even in the midst of restrictions via socially distanced events. The kindergarten commenced planning for their IEYC pre-accreditation process, while taking time to plan for renewal of the physical facilities. They are reviewing an increase in teaching resources and improved usage of the surrounding beauty found in that unique campus.

Island Christian Academy — IslandCA experienced a year of transitions and transformational community strength. With no less than 5 different schedule changes of class delivery over the year, the students and staff rose to a new level of adaptability. The school is entering into its last year of operations at the 70 Bridges Street location and amidst the challenges, the PTA was able to start an Alpha course, set up community based parent buddy systems, and establish a weekly prayer meeting for the school. The strength of the Is-



landCA community was boundless in this year of uncertainty; in spite of frequent jolts to our shared sense of security, this community rallied and resolved to maintain a faith-filled focus on the future hope that God promises his children.

Looking back on this year, we can celebrate and praise the Lord for His presence guiding our steps and unfolding His plans as we progress. We remain thankful for all of our schools' communities, who overcome challenges, provide support for each other, and strive towards achievements through well-placed grit and by God's grace. Amidst the uncertainty and challenges of the past year, we declare the greatness of God, who enables us to tell the generations of his mighty acts over and over again.

The Coronavirus pandemic had significant effects on families in our community during the 2019-20 fiscal year, with commensurate effects on enrolment and tuition fee income in line with our expectations. However, a judicious financial approach, responding carefully to the changing situation, has enabled us to maintain a modest surplus in preparation for the year ahead.



HIS YEAR HAS been a testimony to our school community's resilience, adaptability and unity. Although it continues to be a challenging year for schools everywhere across the world, we saw glimpses of hope to the return of our whole school community. Through God's goodness, faithfulness, protection and blessings, NIS saw the return of all our students for a full day to end the year on a happy and strong note.

The beginning of this year was an exciting and proud moment for the school as we received our accreditation from the International Primary Curriculum. The accreditation was rigorous and looked closely at the delivery of our teaching and learning, including the online provisions we had for students during school closures. To receive this recognition affirms that we are dedicated to our vision and mission in providing quality education for our students to help them develop holistically.

Equipped with knowing the challenges families faced last year, we sought

to continuously improve teaching and learning despite the circumstances we find ourselves in to support our families and students. This year saw the introduction of live Zoom lessons to create more opportunities for interaction between students to build the "classroom environment" and to get to know each other despite being physically apart. We were able to successfully conduct all subject learning online, and students were still able to do science experiments, guided reading lessons and work together virtually in small groups- just to name a few of the valuable learning experiences that we did not want to leave out because it was online learning. We have a wonderful parent community who supported us in our initiatives and devoted themselves to their child's learning.

NIS values relationships and connection between people so this remained a focus for this year as we found creative ways to connect our community. Many of our annual events were still able to take place on campus over several days to allow for social distancing—including

our Chinese New Year Fair, Maths Day, International Green Day, Mothers/Fathers Afternoon just to name a few. Our active Parent-Teacher Association was also dedicated in connecting families together and bringing joy to our students. We had a very memorable Norwegian Day/Viking Fair over a number of days to celebrate the long history of our school.

The challenges of Covid-19 has made it more difficult to get together and children naturally seek connection so throughout the year, we held several Parent Talks to support families with relevant topics such as Zoom Schooling, Parents as Emotional Coaches and the 5 Love Languages of Children to share practical ways for parents to connect with their children and help them make sense of what they are experiencing.

Our Kindergarten moved to Storypark for their online learning platform at the beginning of this school year to facilitate home learning and maintain community sharing during the school closures. Even after full on-campus resumption of the Kindergarten in April, Storypark contin-



ues to be a great way of sharing group and individual learning moments with our families. Because of its success this year, we are planning continuing with Storypark in the coming year. Recently, a parent forum evening was held at the Kindergarten to encourage discussion, suggestions and input on how Storypark can best be used to serve our community in the future.

The Kindergarten creatively held a number of community events throughout this year, including a Chinese New Year "game and red-packet day" at Tai Po Waterfront Park, and a family outing to an Alpaca petting farm in Tai Po. It was great to be out with our students and their families in the fresh air, and enjoying together these amazing places that are so close to our campus!

Our Kindergarten families were also invited to come in and share-in our students' Exhibition of Learning, where the children's unit-long learning about Animal Habitats was showcased. Also, thanks to our amazing and resilient PTA, the Kindergarten students were able to celebrate Norwegian Day at the Kindergarten this year with hot dogs and ice cream, Viking costumes, games and prizes!

To help our students with some additional learning and social skills development, the Kindergarten put together its first-ever Spring Camp, which was run over the Easter holidays. Due to popular demand, a Kindergarten Summer Camp will additionally be held over the upcoming summer break, open to our





Kindergarten families only. The addition of Spring Camp and Summer Camp this year has been be a fun way to extend our active inquiry-based learning, and has additionally given us an opportunity to trial in small groups an Open Learning model of learning. More on our Kindergarten's plans for Open Learning will be announced at the beginning of the new school year!

At the close of this academic year, we are thankful for NIS' strong community and God's provision at every turn. We look forward to what He has instore for us in the coming year and continue to pray for his wisdom and guidance as we forge ahead in fulfilling our vision and mission for the students he has blessed us with.

TH A GRATEFUL HEART, we are delighted to share that Small World has not only been recognised as 'Kindergarten of the Year' at the inaugural Hong Kong Living Education Awards 2021, but that our lovely kindergarten has also just been awarded accreditation by the International Curriculum Association for the International Early Years Curriculum! As we celebrate Small World's 35th year anniversary this vear, we are humbled and honoured to be recognised as an outstanding kindergarten, providing high quality learning experiences for young children and their families. These two recognitions are a great testimony of God's faithfulness to our kindergarten, as we reflect and share these wonderful fruits with our equally remarkable and outstanding learning community! We are blessed to have a community that has been supportive of the school and each other in both good and challenging times. Reflecting on our learning experiences and how we have grown together as a community this year has moved us to understand this verse

ever more deeply and meaningfully, "No matter what happens, always be thankful, for this is God's will for you, who belong to Christ Jesus." (1 Thess 5:18).

This school year has indeed been a

wonderful journey for all of us in Small World—teachers, learners, leaders and community—who have all collaborated together with joy and optimism to nurture our children and their learning in the classroom. Although faced with many challenges and hurdles due to the global pandemic, learning continued for our young learners as they adapted with resilience and continued to flourish in both on-campus and online school learning. In my many years in Small World, first as a parent, a teacher and now as a leader, our community has consistently demonstrated and authentically lived our school shared vision, forging strong home-school relationships so that children can continue to "grow in wisdom (cognitively), stature (physically), in favour with God (spiritually) and men (socio-emotionally)".

There are so many blessings and opportunities that we are thankful for this

school year as we worked together so that our young learners would continue to learn and thrive. Although challenging, the pandemic provided an opportunity to learn how to count our blessings, lean on each other, and have a better understanding of what is genuinely important in our children's and families' lives.

Cultivating authentic relationships with others was pivotal to how we developed and fine-tuned our programme this year, from on-campus school learning to online school learning and back again. Addressing the pandemic did not come easy, but with a strong community committed to learning, our children flourished in Small World. During government-mandated class suspensions, children continued to learn and build relationships with their teachers and peers through online school learning provision. We also responded to families who had difficulties in caring for their children at home, with an emergency care support was introduced in the beginning of the school year to support families. Small World also initiated many learning visits from the children and their families







through the 'Wave Hello to Small World'; 'Exploring Small World with my Daddy, a Date's Date'; and 'Christmas Walk to Small World'. We have also virtually facilitated Coffee Sessions for New Parents; Meet the Teachers- A Curriculum Evening; First Steps Parenting Course; Small World's 35th Online Assembly; Chinese New Year Online Assembly; Parade of Cultures; and Online Open Days!

After many months of online school learning, it was a joy to have our learners back on campus in the last term. It was heartwarming to see our children come to school with smiles on their masked faces, eager to play outdoors and in the garden. Sustainable behaviours were displayed by children and teachers in school, from the art pieces and models made from the recycled materials to their nurture of the garden: planting seeds, pulling weeds, watering plants and

harvesting herbs and flowers! We are so proud of our learners- how each one has grown uniquely and flourished in our Small World.

To conclude, this quote from the accreditation team captured our heart: "All staff have truly exemplified the shared vision of the school: 'Love for today, Learn for tomorrow, Live for eternity and Lead the next generations'. Their love and affection for the children was evident throughout the visit, as was their care for each other." A parent aptly summarised that in Small World, "Children turned out to be kind people, and very thoughtful, and they set them on a lifelong track."

On behalf of our Small World team, with hearts filled with joy and blessings, we are grateful for your trust and the opportunity to serve and educate young children, preparing them the way to a

wonderful path of learning, loving, living and leading!



Norwegian International School

Norwegian International School—originally known as The Norwegian School in Hong Kong—was established in 1982 to provide education for the children of Norwegian missionaries. Norwegian International School engages each student creatively, allowing them to explore their unique talents, while challenging them academically and physically.
